Past/New Business

- Distribution Reversion Award and Amendment (*Doria Rey*)
 - Due to a change in in Staffing at the Compliance Office we will no longer have the staffing to start up the SCRAM program as intended in the reversion application
 - We will shift the reversion money from the SCRAM program to hire an additional Compliance Officer
- DWI Grant and Distribution Application (*Doria Rey*)
 - Grant application is similar to previous year's application, heaviest focus on Compliance Monitoring and Tracking.

Motion to approve DWI Grant and Distribution Application as presented. Motion: Douglas Bowman. Second: Rich Jones. All in favor. None opposed.

- Strategic Prevention Framework - Partnerships for Success Grant Opportunity (*Doria Rey for Tanya Henderson*)
 - This Federal Grant will be to continue the work started by the OSAP Grant
 - OSAP will be coming to an end in FY 2020
 - The three areas of focus will be
 - Underage Drinking
 - Electronic Cigarettes and Vaping (45% of Curry County Highschool Students self-reported using e-cigarettes or vaping)
 - Marijuana
 - Target population – Youth, 9-20 years
 - Why are we no longer focusing on opioids (*Lonnie Leslie*)
 - Working with the OSAP Grant for the last five years we have discovered that our community does not possess the readiness for direct services for opioids at this time
 - Looking at areas where we can have a more immediate effect
 - Are the schools cooperating? (*Douglas Bowman*)
 - The Clovis Municipal School District, specifically Deputy Superintendent, Joe Strickland and Chief Nurse, Carissa Caroland, have been extremely helpful with OSAP and are huge supporters of all of our programs
 - We have had very little cooperation with the other County School districts
 - Requesting Letters of Commitment for the Grant Application
- Annual Spring Break Day Camp (*Doria Rey for Mitch Gray & Oriana Riley*)
 - March 26 – 28, 2019
 - Seventh Annual
 - During the camp, attendees engage in team-activities while learning healthy lifestyle choices, in a structured, yet fun, environment. They are offered the opportunity to build skills such as leadership, communication, and integrity. Youth are also exposed to lessons addressing prevention of alcohol, drugs, and bullying.
 - Community engagement activities, guest speakers, and daily lunches
 - Completely free to attend
 - Could use help from Law Enforcement agencies to do a presentation on drunk driving and to help with the drunk carts and goggles
 - Send email regarding to NMSP, CPD and CAFB

- Where are we with the billboards?
 - Barry School Property – according to Sir Logo it is being produced, just trying to figure out the clamps on the billboard.
 - Will be installed on the side without the trees
 - Still no movement with a photographer on the other billboard. Douglas Ford volunteered to speak with Bob Morgan.

 - Roden Smith Pharmacy, 305 Llano Estacado – Saturday, April 27, 2019, 9:00 am – 1:00 pm
 - Walgreens Pharmacy, 700 E. 21st Street – Saturday, April 27, 2019, 10:00 am – 2:00 pm
 - Drug & Alcohol Symposium – Clovis-Carver Public Library, 701 N. Main Street – Saturday, April 27, 2019, 2:00 pm – 5:00 pm
 - Working with the Sheriff's Office could use more assistance with Law Enforcement
 - Will Walgreens maintain a drop box? (*Lonnie Leslie*)
 - Not anticipated to maintain a box
 - Walgreens has had problems in the past with their drop-box it was stolen in the past.
 - The Hospital (PRMC) does not want to maintain a box either
 - Do the Law Enforcement agencies accept prescription drugs / do they have drop-boxes? (*Naomi Brodkey*)
 - LE will accept if brought to the stations and they will be disposed
 - Do not have controlled lobbies to house drop-boxes
 - Do not want it advertised that they will accept prescription drugs

Public Input for Which No Action Will be Taken

- Thank you for the camera (*Douglas Bowman*)
- Thank you for the radios and microphones (*Rich Jones*)
- What are some successful ways other counties dealing with the current opioid problem? (*Mike Grey*)
 - Offering full wrap-around services for those most at risk, for example those being released from detention centers, working together to pool resources and work on educating all individuals. Focusing on the families of known users and training them how to use Naloxone helps to prevent overdose as well. (*Naomi Brodkey*)
 - In Curry County we are just recently starting to see a problem with opioids, historically this area has a larger problem with marijuana and methamphetamine. However, there is an uptick in cocaine and heroin. But the bigger problem is other drugs being laced with fentanyl (*Douglas Ford*)
 - Working in Albuquerque, having medication management, pharmacy and doctors all in one place helps with treatment. Education with behavioral health and medical providers

helps to develop a community that all works together. But getting buy-in takes a lot of footwork. (Celinia Torres)

- Mental Health Resources received a Naloxone Grant for training and education. They began with two events for medical providers, and are looking at a third event. They are focusing on doctors first to educate them on the dangers of opioids in our community. Offered CEU's for their classes. (Monica Banuelos)


