Meeting called to order at 4:03pm

Introductions

Approval of minutes – December 5, 2019 and January 28, 2020

Motion to approve minutes as written. Motion: Steve Reshetar. Second: Ken Lindsey. All in favor. None opposed.

Reports and statistics from personnel

Teen Court: Kristian Massey - Stats attached

DWI Compliance: Chris Roper – Stats attached. At the last Task Force meeting there was a question about treatment; it seems that treatment is low. The Needs Assessment is required for all DWIs across the state. Results of the assessment provide recommendations for treatment. Roper pulled the NEEDS Assessment results since the last Task Force meeting. Eighteen of them were referred to educational classes. Educational classes are things like AA, Celebrate Recovery, and ACTS. Five were referred to outpatient treatment, one to IOP, and one to a half-way house. Because we don't have a half-way house here, they were referred to IOP.

Prevention: Shelley Meeks – Winding up Positive Action in all the schools. We will be doing celebration activities the first week of March. Joseph Williams reported that Clovis Schools wants

to get Positive Action into every Clovis school; every classroom. That will allow us to focus on rural communities. We were in Grady this year, and have our foot in the door in Texico. We have had no word from Melrose. Henderson asked if there was a chance we could include Clovis Christian school. Meeks responded yes.

Drug Court: Rashan Lawrence – Lawrence could not be here. Information is attached. If anyone has questions, you can email him or he will answer them the next time he is here.

Treatment

Matt 25: Steve Reshetar – Stats attached. Reshetar shared one of the clients was from APO. Roper explained that they probably had felony charge attached. Reshetar suggested that we reach out to APO and let them know they can refer to DWI Program providers for treatment. Treatment is usually one hour a week for 10-12 weeks.

Mental Health Resources: Justin Nutt – Stats attached.

Three7 Project: Kristian Massey – Mitch is not available. Massey shared that BC/GC has 4 boys and 3 girls required to attend. BC/GC groups are peer-to-peer groups made for higher numbers. We are struggling with the effectiveness of it. Sometimes there is only one in attendance and that turns into one-on-one counseling, and that is not what we referred them to. We are researching other options. Massey likes the program and finds it beneficial and effective for the kids. We need more participants. Doing away with citation and working with the schools are two options.

City of Clovis Police Department: Doug Ford – Stats are attached.

Curry County Sherriff's Office: Riley Loomis - Nothing to report. Will email them.

New Mexico State Police: Robert Soule – So far this quarter we have 4 DWIs and one was a juvenile. No DWI related crashes.

Texico Police Department: Doug Bowman – Nothing to report.

Cannon Air Force Base: Rich Jones – Nothing to report.

Special Investigations Division – Issued 5 administrative citations. Conducted one minor compliance operation that did not yield anything.

Office of Substance Abuse Prevention (OSAP) Tanya Henderson

DEA Take Back event update – Getting ready for the take-back event April 25 from 10-2. Henderson will be sending out emails to get support from law enforcement to get our event registered on the website to let people know.

Partnership for Success Grant – OSAP is applying for a SAMHSA grant. Five-year grant to continue prevention services we already have. Letters of commitment would be appreciated. Let Henderson know and she will send an email. March 6, 2020 is the cut-off date. We are looking to submit it Friday, February 28, 2020.

HYPE! – Kristian Massey

CMS Spring Beak (March 23-27) – In the past Three7 Project has provided a day camp, and are no longer able to do it this year, so we decided to pull it in-house through Youth Services and present it ourselves. The program is called HYPE! We will be able to provide it to community and teen court youth. Educational and fun with different topics each day. Monday will be team building activities. Tuesday Henderson will do substance misuse on

4 substances, and in the afternoon (1-3), we will do go-carts and fatal vision goggles. Massey requested help from law enforcement. Soule to check into availability. Wednesday is teen dating violence, anger management, and conflict resolution. Thursday is a mini job fair. Requested law enforcement volunteers. Need an attorney as well. Not booths, but speak for a few minutes. In the afternoon all four branches of the military will be there. Friday is parent day. Wrap up discussions and goals. Then debrief with parents during lunch. It is at the Salvation Army's old thrift store. It is free to use, but they request donations. What is an acceptable donation amount? Len Vohs volunteered to find sponsors. Massey stated sponsors can go on the back of the shirts. HYPE! will be on the front. Concerns raised by Lindsey and Ford about the word "hype" or "hyped" and the negative connotation. Massey stated hype means "help yourself to positive empowerment." Make sure what it stands for is on the shirt also. Massey stated that 15-20 volunteers for the job fair would be appreciated (speakers, not booths). Spears enquired how many attendees are expected? Massey answered 50. We have 20 teen court kids, and then community kids. Need to start advertising now.

Action Items

Reallocation of Reversion Funds (\$5,405) Alternative Sentencing – Shelley Meeks

We planned to install a security camera system in the law library. We got a quote for it and that is the amount we discussed in August. The county decided to pull it in-house, so IT is doing it. With the savings we would like. Moving money from one component to another requires approval by DFA and we have that.

\$2,595 to Alt. Sentencing (Teen Court) for training/education, printing & publishing, and educational materials.

\$2,810 to Prevention for advertising, promotional items, and storage/filing cabinets.

Motion to reallocate funds as written. Motion: Steve Reshetar. Second: Justin Nutt. All in favor. None opposed.

Amend Law Enforcement (Distribution) and Treatment (Grant) contracts – Shelley Meeks

The contracts are running behind and not spending down. Need to amend the contracts, so we can use the funds somewhere else.

Law Enforcement contracts \$16,500. YTD expenditures \$1,105.37.

Meeks is ok holding off on law enforcement to see how that goes, because the Sheriff's Office has really picked up, and the State Police have picked up also. Soule, Bowman, and Loomis feel they can spend down the money.

Motion to table amendment of law enforcement contracts until next quarter. Motion: Jan Salazar-Chairez. Second: Len Vohs. All in favor. None opposed.

Treatment contracts \$48,985. YTD expenditures \$8,915.

Meeks needs a vote to look at the finances and amend the contracts. Massey inquired if the funds could be used for to pay the deputies that provide security for teen court. Meeks replied that no further funds can be used to support teen court from LDWI funds. Treatment includes DWI counseling, DWI groups, Batterer's Intervention, and IOP. Matt 25, MHR, and Meeks feel DWI funds are not being used because many individuals have insurance. Either private or Medicaid. Also, not getting as many referrals through NEEDS

assessments. Nutt cannot even see a circumstance in which MHR would draw down the kind of money we have contracted this year. Ford raised concerns about grantors being restrictive in moving funds around. Meeks stated that it shouldn't be a problem because LDWI will not have a problem with money being moved out of treatment if it is not being used and moved to somewhere it can be used effectively. It is clearly not going to be used. It was treatment, personnel benefits, and the law enforcement contracts that didn't get spent down is where \$18,000 of reversion funds came back from the distribution side. We can apply to get that back in a grant, but when you don't spend it down in the grant its just gone, and we lost about \$14,000 in treatment because we did not amend contracts. Waiting until April is too long, because that doesn't give us enough time to do anything with it. Meeks can be ready by a special meeting on March 2 to discuss how much to amend the contracts by and where the money will go. Ford asked what suggestion Meeks has. Compliance personnel and benefits are being paid for out of compliance fees, which are also running behind. If we can get shift it to be paid out of distribution and grant funds it will be more in balance. We can also increase prevention services. That would be advertising, a social health media campaign, and training facilitators/mentors within county employees to increase capacity. Because when we run into things in teen court and youth services where cannot use DWI funds directly, if we had the capacity internally, we could take care of those youth. Massey stated it would be good to do prevention events also. Advertising and promotional item restrictions have been lifted and that gives us a real opportunity to do some media campaigns. All the flyers and brochures surrounding prevention and youth services are outdated too. Roper asked if we could use treatment funds to assist a probationer with rehabilitation? Meeks, yes, if we could find a provider and get a contract in place. Definitely some to look into for next fiscal year. Meeks expressed some concern about not showing support by funding and want to do treatment. The last couple of years our treatment budget has been around \$40,000, and we are not reaching it. Last year at this time we were at \$15,000, so it was better. I can't write the grant application with \$45,000 in treatment knowing we are not going to be able to spend that down or how we are going to be able to spend that down. Nutt asked about what we do for education now. Roper responded with free community classes offered through religious organizations. Funds have never gone to education. In Nutt's professional experience educational classes are 6-8 hour taught by a licensed therapist. Insurance won't pay for educational classes. Nutt wondered if it would be an option. Roper thinks it would be nice to have a set class. If someone put together a class, we would be happy to refer to it. Vohs brought up The Ranch as an option. The Ranch is not currently certified. Can part of the grant pay for rehab? Meeks asked Nutt if developing educational classes was something he was volunteering to do? Meeks, Roper, and Nutt to meet to discuss if something can be done during this fiscal year and to build it into next fiscal year.

Beautify and maintain a median between CAFB and Clovis – Shelley Meeks

Use of VIP funds to beautify, need volunteers to maintain, and DWI Program funds for signage. Issues of safety were expressed as a concern. Lindsey stated it's a great idea in theory, but in practicality we encounter too many problems and too much liability. Salazar-Chairez thinks a good idea and all of us take turns maintaining it in the early morning. There are still concerns about the business of the highway during all hours. If we did concrete with metal sculptures, it would not require much upkeep.

Motion to beautify and maintain a median between CAFB and Clovis. Motion: Justin Nutt. Second: Len Vohs. One in favor. Majority opposed.
